# **Edmundsbury Court Estate**

This is a spectacular community led hanging basket scheme – with hundreds of spring bulbs planted, 105 tree saplings from The Woodland Trust and a water garden and planters. The paved area in the centre provides innovative seating. A little oasis surrounded by high buildings, right at the heart of Brixton.

#### **Ace of Clubs**

In the space of a few short years this garden has been transformed from a neglected patch to a beautiful oasis of colour and scents. This has been achieved without any statutory funding but with the vision and dedication of one centre user. The result is a community asset which can be shared with the Ace of Clubs staff, clients and volunteers to provide a tranquil retreat from often very stressful and chaotic lives.


# Southwell Road Residents' Garden

Southwell Road Residents' Garden has been established over the last year on a previously concreted over backyard. There is a food growing area with raised beds and fruit trees and a garden area with a lawn and well-planted flower beds. The garden was established as a cooperative effort between The Lost Effra Project, Lambeth Council and the Loughborough Farm which now provides a monthly food growing session for residents.


In simple terms the role of the London Gardens Society is to stimulate pride in London by the cultivation of flowers and gardens in particular.

#### The finalists

#### Loughborough farm

A community food growing project where people can take home and cook their crops while excess is sold to fund their project! The garden produces a huge variety of crops and hosts some innovative and art projects that engage a huge number of people.







#### **Edmundsbury Court Estate**

The garden is designed by residents with emphasis on the surroundings. It is an integrated part of the estate community, encouraging residents to work together and share skills. The use of space is particularly good. There's lots packed in and good composting and signage.







#### **Lairdale Estate**

A small group of residents get together every fortnight to grow veg and fruits and teach children how to eat healthy. The result is a fantastic garden -by far the most abundant plot in our competition. Their plans for BBQing their harvest will surely get more people involved!







# Paradise Garden Coade Court (Hyde Housing)

Until last year, the garden space at Coade Court was unloved, uninviting and underused. Thanks to the commitment and passion shown by the residents, the space stands out as a haven of nature and community spirit - 'Paradise Garden' is certainly deserving of its name. #### **Pat Broderick**

Pat always contributes her knowledge of the estate to the Weir Tenants and Residents Association and the regular estate walkabouts, and has only just stopped attending the area housing forums despite being in her 80s. She has been the heart of the Weir estate for over 50 years. She is the person residents go to for a chat, for some advice or indeed for some history. She knits the community together by being around, being available and being there for everyone.

#### Stephen Keogh

A resident of Stockwell for over thirty years, Stephen volunteers to open, close, and liaise with the public for The Old Laundry's community use. Stephen meets and greets residents of all walks of life with the warmest of welcomes. He works with women in isolation, single parents, other seniors and on intergenerational projects with youth. He organises local events including senior's luncheons, community family days as well as the annual sea-side trip.

#### **George Richardson**

George has been a fantastic leader in his community for many years. He chairs the local neighbourhood watch – but goes above and beyond his duties. He has actively worked with council staff to prevent anti-social behaviour, leading to tangible improvements to the local neighbourhood. George recently organised a community 'Freshview' day, which involved local residents coming together to build planters and spruce up front gardens on the street.

An individual or group who makes the most of the assets available to them and uses their skills and networks to improve the wellbeing for residents and the community in the local area in new and innovative ways.

#### Sports City London Ltd – Blackprint Legacy Foundation

Benjamin Ackim, born and raised in Lambeth, is the founder of both charities. A recognised brand, Sports City London, founded in 2011, currently delivers quality sports sessions and community development programs across the capital. To date, they have engaged 20,000 people aged 5-24 through their projects and programs -one of the leading organisations in youth engagement. The Blackprint Legacy Foundation supports significant role models and extraordinary young people that have displayed innovation and commitment to their community. In July 2016 they will be releasing a magazine featuring 50 of the UK's most inspirational young people (entrepreneurs, social enterprises, projects, and event owners) and deliver the Blackprint Project which will inspire 60,000 young people across the country.



# Waterloo Community Theatre CIC

WCT was set up by Lambeth resident Anna Glarin, a theatre practitioner and drama facilitator. WCT offer free weekly drama workshops for 8-14 year olds and are currently oversubscribed, confirming Anna's hunch that this was greatly needed in the area. The young people in the group have expressed how taking part has increased their confidence, helped them make new friends and try new things. Anna gives her time free of charge as does her excellent team of volunteers that she has recruited, all bringing their own particular skill and adding value to the project.



#### **Tree Shepherd**

Colin Crooks started Tree
Shepherd in 2011. For over 20
years he has been supporting the
more disadvantaged members
of our community. Colin seeks
out areas in the borough of
particular need - estates such as
Angell Town, Tulse Hill, Stockwell,
Loughborough - and sets up
enterprise programmes that help
entire communities. He has also
founded the Forest Foundation
to raise money for Lambeth's low
income start-ups.

#### The finalists

#### **Brixton Soup Kitchen**

Brixton Soup Kitchen was founded in January 2013 by Solomon Smith and Mahamed Hashi. They help homeless people by providing free food, support and company. Their aim is to empower people in a warm and friendly environment – helping them gain the confidence and self-worth needed to get back on their feet. It takes hard work for feeding, clothing and educating the homeless. A dedicated team of people who are merely there to give back to our community.

#### **St Matthews Project**

This project works with young people in Lambeth, many of whom have had difficult times both at home and in education. Through sports coaching, mainly football, they are encouraged to build a sense of selfesteem and confidence. Lee Dema and his coaching team are incredibly dedicated to the young people, helping them seek out opportunities for further training and employment as well as building their sporting skills.





#### Whippersnappers

Whippersnappers aim to provide a diverse cultural platform from which children and adults of all ages, needs and backgrounds can express and educate themselves through music, sports and the arts. Whippersnappers were founded in 1994 when Caroline Burghard a professional actress and mime artist teamed up with Kirk Service an established R&B and Reggae artist. For the past 20 years the company has been based in The Brockwell Lido in Brockwell Park, Brixton and deliver London wide, nationally and internationally.







Incredible Edible Lambeth is a collection of people and organisations who work together to make sure that healthy, sustainable, locally produced food is available to everyone living in Lambeth, regardless of income, both now and in the future. It all started in with Incredible Edible Todmorden (Yorkshire) and we found the ethos inspiring. We believe in systems which are easily replicable and have an eco-system of their own. Many of our projects demonstrate this.

Like most London boroughs, Lambeth is a series of interconnecting villages. Those villages are full of people growing and producing food (123 growing projects and counting). They are also full of people who suffer food poverty and ill health. Lambeth is a diverse borough offering a rich food heritage.

Our aim is to increase healthy sustainable food grown, produced, sold and eaten by transforming our local food system, by celebrating, supporting and strengthening community food activity and the connections between local people and local food. Incredible Edible Lambeth is everyone who cares about our aims and is connected to Lambeth through living or working. ## Young resident of the year

#### The finalists

#### Jacqueline Gomes-Neves

Jacqueline is the former Lambeth Youth Mayor. She founded the Brixton Youth Form at the Marcus Lipton youth centre in Brixton which saw young people have a voice in the running of a club they were key attendees at, and she is a key volunteer for the Brixton Soup Kitchen. She is also the first and only female youth mayor to date in Lambeth! Jacqueline has been a strong and selfless champion for young people all across Lambeth for a long while now.



#### Elmgreen School / Streetworks project team

A group of thirteen Year 9 girls from Elmgreen School have worked together as part of Streetworks to improve the alleyway leading to Tulse Hill Station. They've developed a project plan, consulted local residents and businesses and designed improvements to the space which will be constructed as part of improvements to West Norwood. Their designs include a mural, colourful paving, better signage to the station, improved lighting to make the space feel safer at night, greening and new seating. They have worked with Poetry Slabs, a local arts project, to identify locations for a poem to be displayed. They presented their project to senior officers at TfL and advised them on how organisations can be more inclusive in their community engagement. The project has improved their performance at school and has helped them to think about their career options in transport and engineering!



#### Rianne Yeboah-Cornelius

This young resident has been an incredible inspiration, shining example and much valued youth volunteer supporting The Point in all its various projects, events and activities since the start. She has not only contributed her time and energy from helping to run baking sessions, building sheds in the communal garden and fundraising but she contributes her creative ideas, abilities and talents in the design of our great marketing material. She is as passionate about her local community as the older committee members and believes in trying to make a difference.

#### **Andrew Chan Sing**

Andrew, one man owner-server of the Kennington Coffee Shop, acts like the old fashioned village telephone exchange "Connecting you to...". He makes introductions between everybody waiting for their order - we have gained many clients as a result for our tailoring business. Andrew is extremely kind and observant and the living embodiment of interconnectiveness. In his understated. cool way, he does as much as any organisation to bring local people together. Sometimes as prosaic as "You say your tap is dripping? Meet Hughie the plumber!", sometimes saving a life.

#### **Erica Tate**

Erica Tate has been the Chair of Tulse Hill Forum for four years and steered the Forum to create a positive identity for the area working tirelessly to fulfil the Forum's "Our People, Our voice" strapline. Erica is inspirational and a true leader; the Forum under her leadership has an active membership of 28 and is in regular contact with over 300 people. The Forum is the place where many different groups are represented including from all the TRAs, St Matthews project and Trinity church. This helps strategic discussions to take place and joint funding bids to be discussed.

#### **Molly Sinclair**

Roupell Park has a resident who is a real gem - Molly Sinclair, an 87 year old lady who has lived on the estate for the past 52 years, or since her block went up, and was one of the first residents to move in. Molly has been the Chair of the coffee morning group for the past 12 years. The group meets every week, with 14 faithful members. Last year, Molly secured £400 from external funding which enabled the group to go for an outing of their choice, to Eltham Palace. She is also mastering computing at the moment, so that she could read all the board papers online and make use of her IPad.

#### **Hazel Fraser**

Hazel played a key role in setting up the Stanthorpe Triangle Residents Association over 20 years ago. Throughout the years Hazel's unassuming manner has hidden a driving force that is always there to provide a wide range of ideas and support to friends and neighbours. She quietly undertakes often time consuming, organisational tasks without a word of complaint. She was instrumental in getting the Association known to our Councillors, Member of Parliament, the Police Force and the Fire Service and inviting them to share in, and contribute to meetings and activities as appropriate.

Hazel has been a stalwart of our community and a role model to many others who now also devote a great deal of their time into making the STRA the very successful community group it is today.



#### **Dr Anis Ayub**

Anis regularly visits the homes of lonely elderly people to see if they are ok and check whether they need anything. If she finds any sick elderly she helps them to call the ambulance and sometimes acts as an interpreter to the people with language barriers. She also cooks and provides hot meals for a few neighbours.

She gives advice on healthy eating to the residents and, being a keen gardener, she encourages people to grow their own vegetables.

Anis works tirelessly to bring together people with different cultural backgrounds, start dialogue and create harmony and community cohesion.
